The Flying Dutchmen Log

1954-1958 (with annotations)



September, 1954: We, the freshman class, assembled shortly after 8:20 on the morning of September 7, 1954. Each of us was assigned to a home room and given a class schedule. (Remember the quizzical faces that confronted us as we walked through the door.)

October, 1954: After arduous preparation, we successfully sponsored the annual Halloween Dance. (Square Dance music provided the entertainment for a fun-filled evening.)

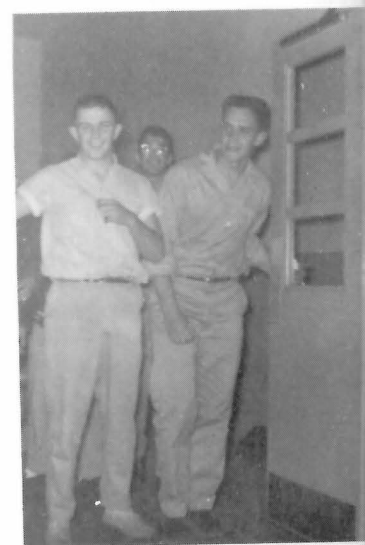


January, 1955: At the half-way mark of our first term, we were tested for skill and knowledge. (We came through successfully.)

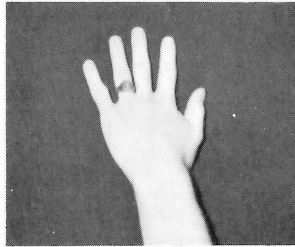
September, 1955: After a well-deserved summer vacation, we returned to begin our second year. (Adjustments were made, and soon everything was back to routine.)



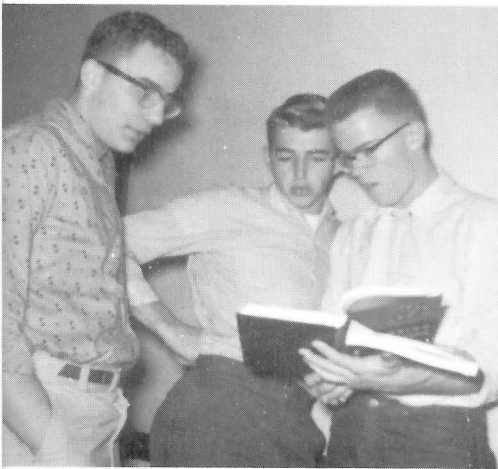
December, 1955: Work was set aside so that all could join in the Christmas festivities. With a myriad of snowflakes surrounding us, we danced our way through the Sno-Ball. (What a transformation was wrought in the school cafeteria.)



June, 1956: Tests were administered to determine whether we were worthy of promotion. (On move-up day we again thrilled with pride as we assumed the title of the jolly juniors.)



September, 1956: Bearing our new title of upperclassmen, we undertook the studies that would determine our future life. (The concession stand, initiated during our sophomore year, provided us with a financial foundation for our class activities.)



December, 1956: Christmas was highlighted with the arrival of our classrings. The rings were of gleaming gold, crested with a replica of our school symbol, the FLYING DUTCHMEN. (We observed that many of the rings soon found their way to other hands.)



March, 1957: With chairmen elected and committee members assigned, we drafted plans for the most enjoyable social event of our year --the Junior Prom. (Remember how everyone pitched in to help--even the football players, whom we discovered making tissue flowers.)



April, 1957: On the evening of April 27, our efforts were rewarded. We stepped into the ballroom we had created, a SPRINGTIME SERENADE. It was a serenade composed of pastels and written in a meter of waltzes and flowers. The hands of the clock seemed to spin with double speed, for all too soon the evening was over. (All that remained were our delightful memories.)

June, 1957: By now, we had completed the first three years of our high school career. (We had but one remaining step--our senior year.)



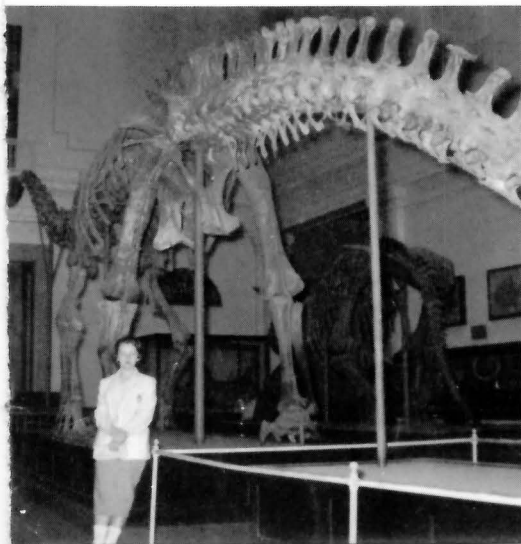
October, 1957: With the coming of fall, our class jackets and hats arrived. Once again, the corridors were brightened with the colors of the graduating class. This year, we had chosen royal blue and white. (We wore our colors proudly.)

Washington Trip

November, 1957: Perhaps the most exciting experiences of our high school days occurred during our Washington trip. It began in the vague hours of the morning of November 18. Accompanied by songs and gossip, we passed the time required to make the long trip and found ourselves in Washington by early afternoon.

After touring the National Cathedral and Franciscan Monastery, we checked into our hotel, unpacked, and dressed for a nightclub supper and a movie in cinerama. We returned to the hotel for a twelve o'clock bed-check. (The combined efforts of three chaperones proved futile in stopping the capers, which continued throughout the night.)

Because of our subconscious habit of answering the telephone when it rings, the operator was able to arouse us for the activities of the following day. Stopping only for meals, we toured half of Washington, visiting monuments, government offices, museums, and memorials. After a shopping tour we were given a night of liberty. We scattered to the four corners of the city, but had to return to the hotel for the midnight deadline, which came all too soon. Arsenic and Old Lace

April, 1958: After weeks of painstaking preparation, a well-rehearsed cast was ready for the first performance of our senior play. The 3-act presentation we had chosen, ARSENIC and OLD LACE, was a Pulitzer Prize-winning play written by Joseph Kesselring. The comedy was placed under the very capable direction of Miss Theresa Lantz.

The plot revolves around two demented maiden ladies who remove transients from their worldly troubles by doses of arsenic served in wine. They are aided by their nephew, who thinking he is Teddy Roosevelt, disposes of the bodies by burying them in the cellar which he believes is the Panama Canal.

The romantic involvement of the play centers around a New York drama critic and nephew of the aunts, Mortimer Brewster, and the minister's daughter, Elaine, who lives next door. Brewster is greatly disturbed because of the insanity which characterizes his family.

The unwelcome arrival of the Brewster's second nephew, Jonathan, who strongly resembles Boris Karloff, creates not only a terrifying but also a humorous situation. He is accompanied by Dr. Einstein, a quack plastic surgeon, who indulges in quite a bit of excessive drinking. With the help of Dr. Einstein, Jonathan has murdered as many people as his maiden aunts, a fact which disturbs the ladies greatly.

However, the play ends on a hilarious note, as, with Jonathan back in prison, and Mortimer and Elaine happily united, the aunts make ready to dispose of their 13th victim.



Class Day

May, 1958: With the traditional passing of the school banner from the seniors to the future graduating classes of '59--'60--'61--'62, we began our class day festivities. Following this presentation, the movies of our Washington trip were shown, to the amusement and pleasure of all.

Following our "move-up" song we, the graduating class, took our places on the stage and permitted the juniors to fill our vacated seats.

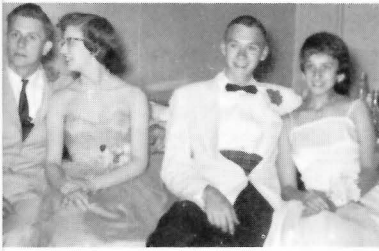
The presentation of gifts by Betty Jane Krieg and Denny McClain marked the close of our class day program.

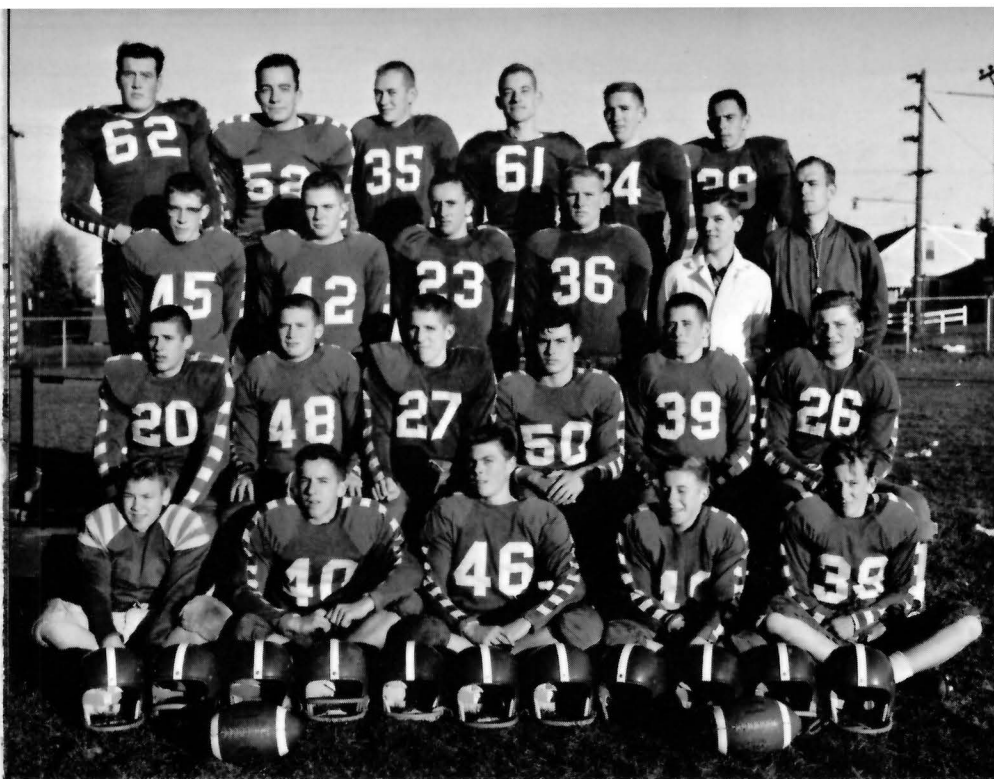

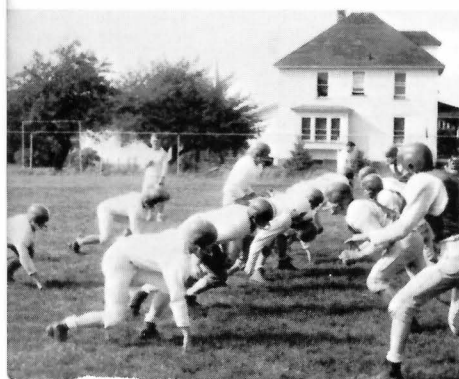
Junior Dutch

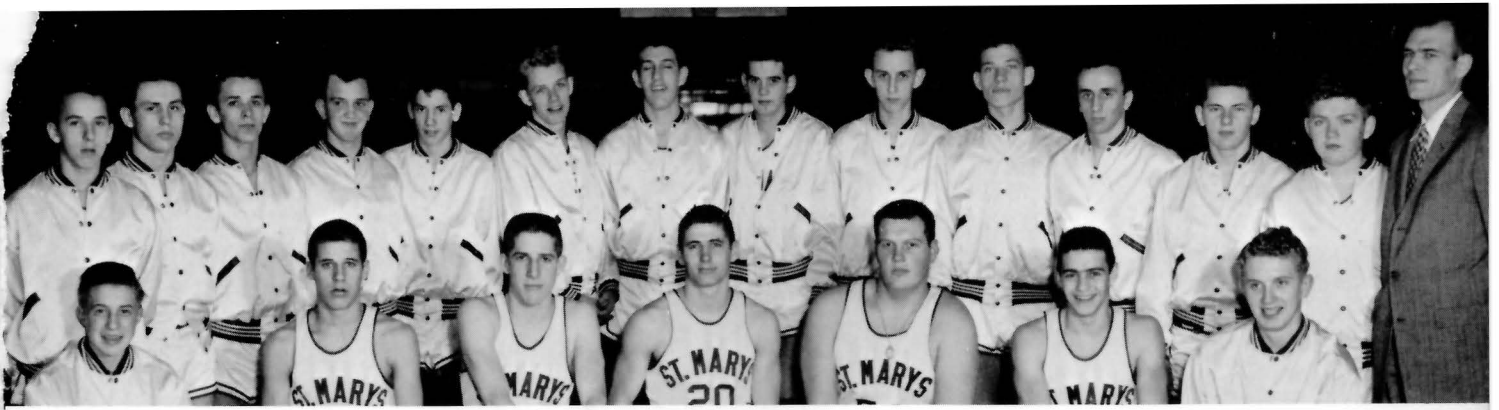

In their final outing, the Dutch compiled their highest score by downing the Ridgway Elkers, 77-56, in the county seat.

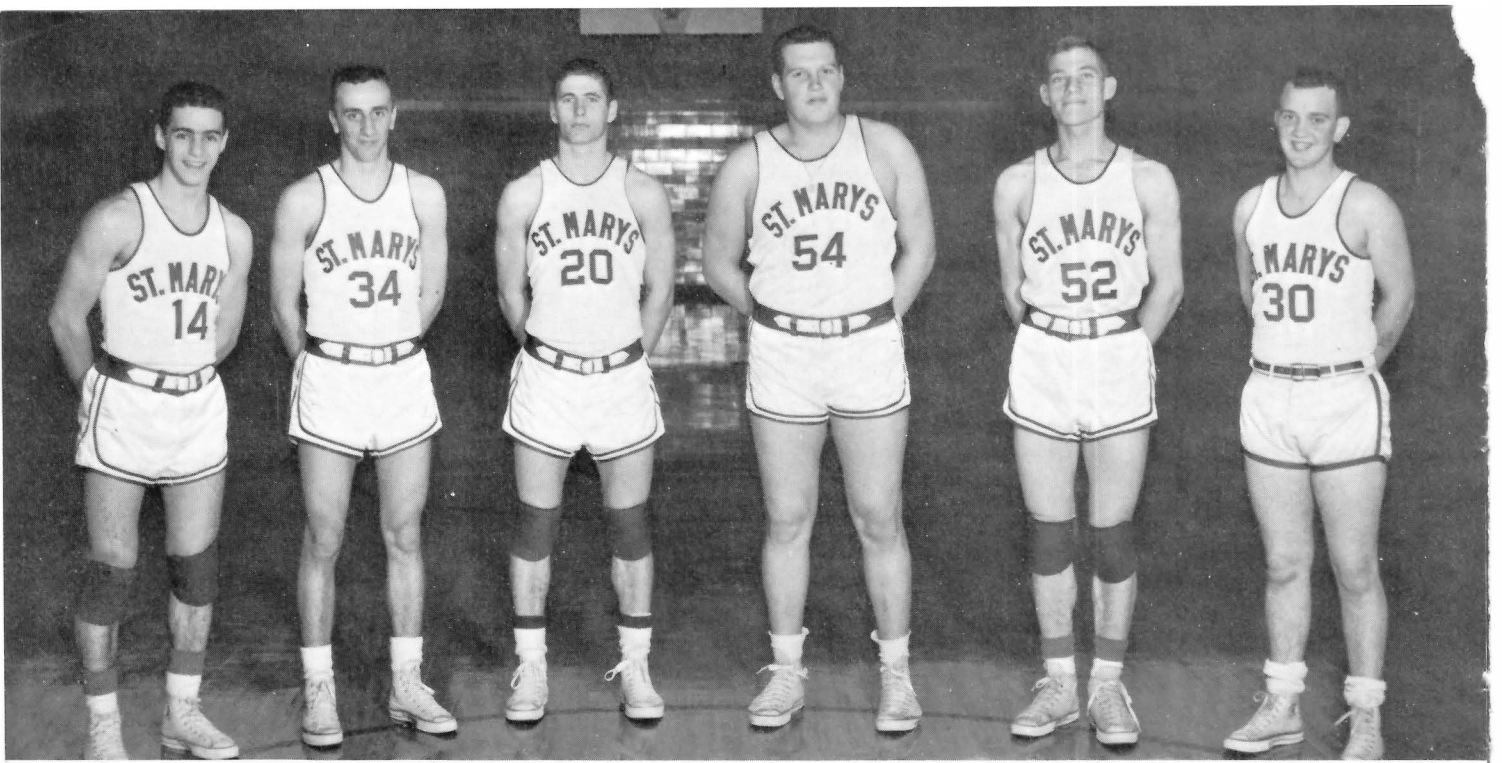

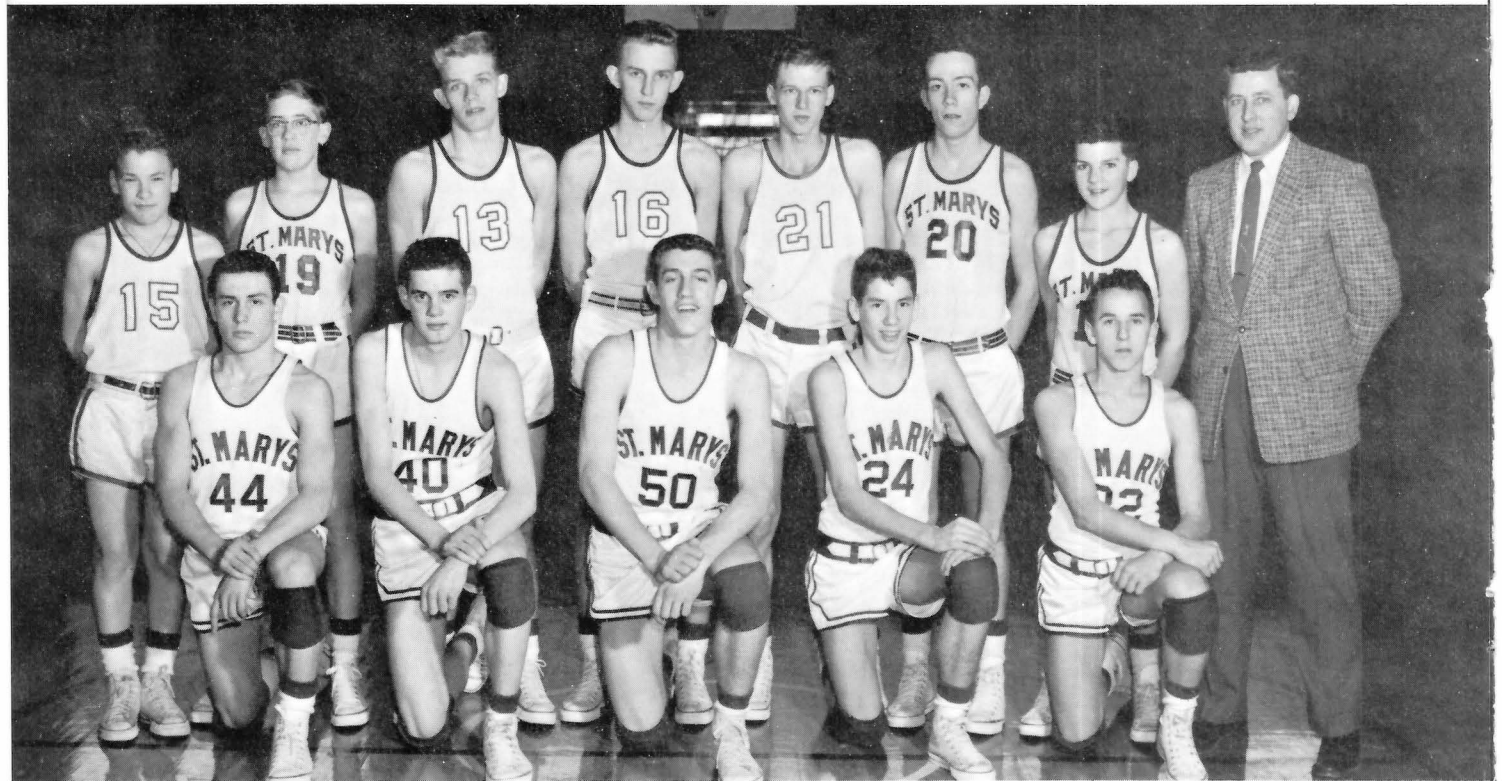

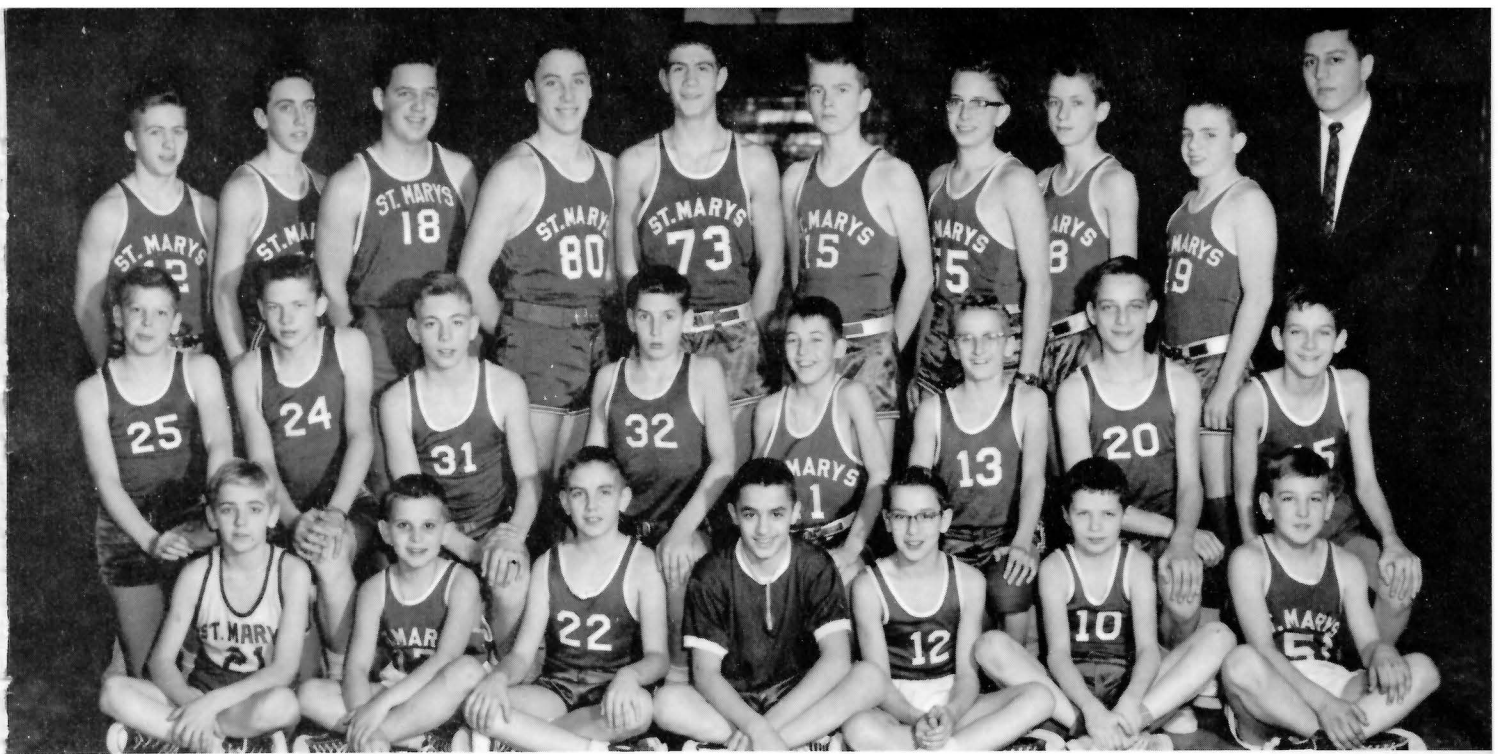

Although the Junior High then lost 6'1" Jim Cole to the Junior Varsity squad, they downed Emporium again by a score of 27-20.

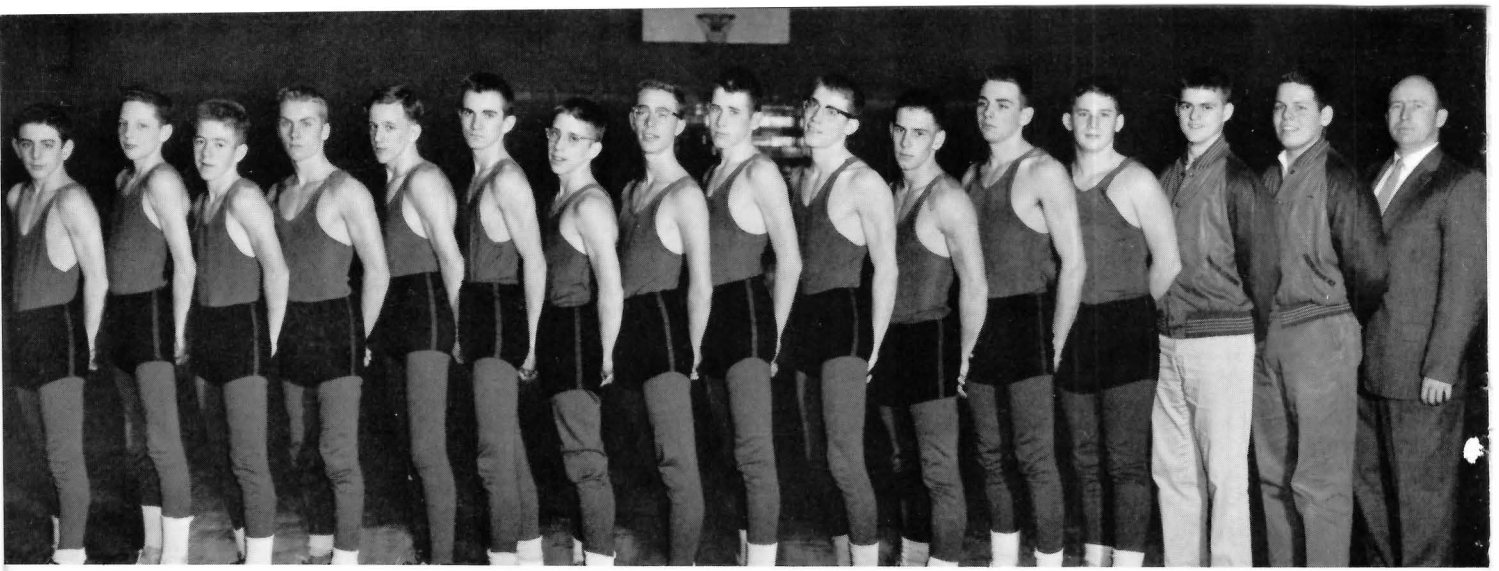
St. Marys appeared in Brockway on Wednesday of that same week and posted their seventh victory in as many starts. As the final buzzer sounded, the score read 32-23.
